

Compact Workshop 6—Woodworking Shop/Chris Rueby

Chris Rueby sent in some photos of the wooden clocks he makes using Sherline equipment, but along with the email he included a photo of his shop. It seemed to fit right in with this page, so I have included it here. It is another good example of a den or bedroom shop that takes up very little space but obviously turns out a lot of good work. He sent no details about the ship or aircraft models, but below is a photo of one of his wooden clocks.



About the clocks, Chris says, “I cut the gears using the milling column with the rotary table and a slitting saw. The shafts were all turned down on the lathe. Turned out nicely, and keeps good time. Everything but the clock dial and hands are Beech, the hands are walnut with a cherry plywood dial

face. The only metal in it is a pair of drafting weights for the weight. The rotary table made cutting the gears a breeze—only about 20 minutes for the larger gears.”
